

Hydrangea quercifolia

Cultivar	Flower Notes	Foliage & Habit
Alice	Cream-white sepals, almost halfdollar-size, cover the fertile flowers and age to pink-rose as they mature. The dark green summer foliage turns burgundy-red in autumn.	12' high & wide. Quite vigorous; more sun tolerant.
Dayspring	Large white flowers	Deep green foliage turns red-bronze in fall.
Ellen Huff	White flower spikes	4' high & wide. Burgundy-red and orange fall color.
Harmony	Mostly setrile, large inflorescences.	Large shrub to 10 feet.
Pee Wee	Broad-pyramidal shaped inflorescence. Sepals are delicate, small, abundant and almost hide the fertile flowers. Fall color is rose to red-purple.	Compact form, 2-3' tall and wide in six years. An excellent form for small gardens. Red fall foliage.
Sike Dwarf	Pretty white flowers.	2' to 2-1/2' tall by 4' wide.
Snow Queen	Larger and more numerous sterile florets provide a more dense, solid appearance. Inflorescences are held upright and don't bend or arch. Flowers turn a good pink as they mature.	More compact grower, maybe 6' high at maturity. Slower growing than Alice.
